Just north of the Dallas/Fort vise versa. Worth Metroplex is the new project will bridge linking Lake Dallas and Little Elm and the North Dallas Tollway and a revitalized downtown area are attracting attention from developers, business owners and residents alike. The once again provide a vital transportation link between Lake Dallas and Little Elm. The conceptual design of the project entails eight sections that, together, total 13 miles.

GREEN CITIES

40 of the largest cities in the U.S. are actively engaged in reducing their carbon footprints, says the report "Green Cities." The report is based on conversations with leading thinkers and practitioners, says the non-profit, Living Cities, produced which "Green Cities" looks at what cities have accomplished and identifies areas in falling which efforts are short. The cities that participated in the survey are: New York City, Los Angeles, Chicago, Houston, Phoenix, Philadelphia, San Antonio, San Diego, Dallas, San Jose, Detroit, Jacksonville, San Francisco, Indianapolis,



Columbus, Austin, Fort Worth, Memphis,

Charlotte, Baltimore, Boston, El Paso, Milwaukee, Seattle, Nashville, Denver, Washington, D.C., Las Vegas, Louisville, Portland, Oklahoma City, Tucson, Albuquerque, Atlanta, Miami, Oakland, Minneapolis, Pittsburgh, Saint Paul, and Cleveland.

The most concrete municipal commitment is the U.S. Conference of Mayors Climate Protection Agreement. As of April, 935 mayors representing more than 83.5 million citizens pledged to reduce greenhouse gases 7% from 1990 levels by 2012.

Where are cities excelling? An increasing number of cities are using green strategies to advance economic recovery efforts and create jobs. Where are cities falling short? They aren't yet connecting lowincome people and underinvested urban communities to their greening efforts, which would allow them to build stronger communities for the long term. They are still focused on "top level" initiatives and need to start drilling down.

PERMIT TECHNICIANS CERTIFICATION TESTING CHANGES

The Board for International Professionals Standards (BIPS) met April 21, 2009 and the request to add a second level to the Permit Technician Exam was discussed. This action was not approved. At this time they viewed a second level to the Residential Plans Examiner certification and do not see a need for it.

For those preparing to take the Permit Technician Exam, please be aware that the code books will change. Beginning January 2010, the exam will cover the 2009 IBC and the 2009 IZC. The Basic Code Enforcement and Legal Aspects will stay the same at this time.

From other discussions, the ICC Permit Technician Exam Development Committee has also reviewed issues regarding the types of questions in the exam. Some of the questions we felt were above the level of Permit Technicians responsibilities and some of those questions will be removed from the exam
